<u>Cúinne na Gaeilge / Irish Language</u> <u>Corner</u>

How Gaelic surnames work

- Gaelic surnames are the original and correct form of many surnames in the area. These names were corrupted as part of a deliberate policy that existed against the Gaelic culture going as far back as the 1366.
- Gaelic names respect both male and female forms with the prefixes that follow: 'Mac' or 'Mag' meaning son and 'Nic' or 'Nig' daughter of.
- O means grandson or descendent and the female version is Ní.

Examples in local names

Mc Donnell, McDonald, Mc Connell and Mc Gonnell are all corruptions of *Mac Domhnaill* for a man and *Nic Dhomhnaill* for a lady. (name means son daughter of Domhnall from the famous Gaelic Chieftains of the Isles and Antrim)

Hegarty is a corruption of \acute{O} $\acute{h}\acute{E}igeartaigh$ for a man and $N\acute{t}$ $\acute{E}igeartaigh$ for a lady (a branch of the Clann Eoghain from western Ulster).
